A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT LEN

That was why the club was formed 15 years ago!
- This year we have welcomed a number of new members, with 3 new couples joining the same time at the **Collie** rally! Sadly, we have also seen a few of our members leave the club due to health issues. We wish them all the best.
- The **Rally Program** for 2020 was updated in November and you should have received a copy in an email. Please contact me if you didn't receive it or need a hard copy. We have tried to make the program interesting and have included a few places we haven't visited for a while (or not at all!) We will also venture a little further from Perth than we have in recent years, for example **Hopetoun**. It is always good to try different ideas. - The **Annual General Meeting** (AGM) will be held later than usual next year, around May to early June. Members will recall that we adopted the Model Rules published by the Department of Mines, Industry Regulation & Safety (previously the Department of Commerce). These rules replaced our old constitution and will determine how our AGM will be run. The first Newsletter of 2020 will be devoted to providing more information on the process. However, I will flag some of the key changes here for members to consider.
 - All committee members are now elected annually at the AGM.
 - There is no limit to the number of times a committee member can be elected.
 - Nominations for positions must be received by the **President** (in the absence of a club secretary) at least 28 days before the AGM and must include a statement of support from another member (ie a nomination).

Details on the date and location of the AGM will be sent out with the Newsletter. I will, however, take this opportunity to urge members to think about nominating for a role on the Committee. We are down to a core group of 4 at present and while we have coped well, the situation is neither sustainable nor in the best interests of the club. A big "thank you" to the Committee and all those who have organised activities at our rallies. Without their commitment it would not be possible to run a club.

On behalf of your committee I wish members a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.
