Saturday 3rd: We awoke to a stunning sunrise followed by a misty, cool morning. With our picnic lunches stowed in vehicles, we set off for a day of fun-in-the-sun, in and around Hyden. First stop was the **Hyden Bush Village Bakehouse** for morning tea. We climbed the rock to the communications tower and admired the views of the countryside. All were impressed! PUBLIC SILO TRAIL - ROVING RALLY AUGUST 2019

Monday 5th (Day 1): The three vans left Tressies Caravan Park, Karlgarin, at 10:10am in a light shower of rain, with our first stop being in the 'Wave Zone' (Shire of Lake Grace) at a 'Magic Window' on the edge of a salt lake, approx. 10kms from Lake Grace.

The **Magic Window** is there to encourage people to admire and appreciate the view and also to preserve and protect these areas. No littering! This is where we took our first photo of the rally, with the sun shining brightly again for the 'Magic Moment'.

We moved on to Lake Grace where Phil and Len topped up their fuel, then into Arjo's Coffee



Shop for a leisurely coffee break before adjourning to the Big Shed in the main street for our picnic lunch. By 1:00pm we were on our way again, heading towards **Newdegate**. On arriving we stopped at the silos to admire the clever artwork by **Brenton See** and take some photos of the four silos featuring the Western Bearded Lizard, a Mallee Fowl, a Thigh Spotted Tree Frog and a Red Tailed Phascogale!





By 2:20pm we were moving on again heading towards **Lake King**. As we passed through the salt lakes on approach to **Lake King** we could see a very slight tinge of pink to the water. Coming into **Lake King**, the **Bush Mechanics Tractor Museum** beckoned us, so we spent some time looking at the different ways that the farmers in the 70's and 80's had adapted the standard tractors to suit the local needs and conditions, using their own ingenuity and skills to join tractors together, add a truck cab onto a tractor etc. etc.

We settled into the caravan park around 3:30pm. Later, **Happy Hour** was in the small Campers Kitchen (just enough room for the 6 of us) where we reviewed the events and sights of the day as well as the answers to the Fun Travel Quiz, which Chris and Marilyn had given earlier in the day. 6pm and dinner was had at the **Tavern**. The soft lighting, warm interior and great food made a very pleasant finish to our first day of the rally.

Tuesday 6th (Day 2): Drizzle did not dampen our spirits as we left Lake King just after 9:00am driving up and down many hills and seeing lots of beautiful emerald green pastures as we made our way towards Ravensthorpe. Luckily, there were parking spaces available for us all on the hill outside the Bread & Butter Bar Café. After a quick visit into the Farmers Union supermarket over the road for some basic supplies, we crossed back to the café for a leisurely cuppa and a sausage roll for one (there was only one! home-made! Len couldn't resist!). Returning to the cars, we drove down to Hopetoun, again enjoying the changing scenery along the way. When we arrived at the Hopetoun Caravan Park we were amazed at the HUGE collection of succulents growing just outside the reception area in pots, cages and the ground. We chose sites amongst the trees with lots of shade and the sound of waves crashing nearby.



Once we had set up our vans, we went for an afternoon drive to **East Mt. Barren**. We were all very impressed with what we saw! Work is continuing in this area to make it user-friendly and safe with good roads and signage. The views from up there towards **Hopetoun** and to **West Mt Barren** are stunning.

There are masses of native flora, including **Qualup Bells** and **Royal Hakea** alongside the roads with walking tracks into the bush. Len and Graham read the signs re the Walk Trail up East Mt. Barren, then cleaned their shoes as per instructions and took a short walk along the trail. Upon their return to the cars they both vowed they would be back soon to conquer the mountain! Back down the hill and into town we went for a drive around the streets of **Hopetoun**...it is bigger than we first thought!

5:00pm Happy Hour was in the Campers Kitchen. (Thanks to Phil and Chris for the use of their heater). We were now all in jackets and beanies as we chatted for a while about our adventures, before making way for the other campers - the Melbourne mob who wanted to cook their dinner in there! It was very cold and starting to rain....time to go back to our vans for dinner and an early night.

Wednesday 7th (Day 3): Following hot showers and breakfast we packed up and left the Hopetoun Caravan Park at around 9:30am. Stopping at the CRC on the way out of town, we gathered a selection of informative booklets re the town and surround to help with our future planning, plus chatted to a staff-member who gave us tips on visiting part of the Farm Gate Art Trail, which is a selection of crafts made using scrap steel waste from farms. Then we were on our way again!

Heading towards **Ravensthorpe** once more, with only 15kms to go, we noticed a VERY LARGE blue-and-white tea set on the roadside at a street corner. This was part of the **Farm Gate Art Trail**. Parking up, we wandered over to have a closer look and a peek at our first roadside **Donkey Orchids** for the season. Several stops followed after this, as we were in and out of the cars looking at an array of other art projects, some funny, some clever and some quirky.







A little further along our convoy pulled off the road into a free-camp area for a quick look. We had considered this area for a one-night stop but changed our plans when the weather threatened. All agreed that this area would be great in *fine* weather.

After a short time back on the bitumen, we were back in **Ravensthorpe**, stopping once again at **the Bread and Butter Café**. Feeling refreshed, we headed out of town to the silos. These silos were painted by a world-renown artist **Amok Island**, in a very different style to those that we had seen earlier. They feature the flowering cycle of a **banksia** which is native to the region and are painted on both front and back of the silos.





Having quickly taken our group photo with the flag, we moved on towards **Jerramungup** stopping in a truck bay 60kms out, for a lunch stop in vans as the day was still cold and windy.

We arrived at the caravan park mid- afternoon, with payment made via the envelope-in-the-box system. The large drive-through sites made it easy to set up the vans, and we were soon walking around the town to familiarize ourselves with the town layout. Happy Hour was in a large Campers Kitchen followed by dinner in vans as it was very cold!

Thursday 8th (Day 4): 9:00am and we set off from **Jerramungup** in search of another set of silos. Again it was a cold and windy day and so morning tea was had in Chris and Phil's van parked on the roadside along Pingrup Road. By 10:45am we were on our way again and were soon at **Pingrup**, standing in front of the silos there.

This set of three images was painted by artist **Evoca 1** and is a 'tip of the hat' to WA's tenacious, resourceful farming communities'. Overall consensus from our group was that this artwork was truly showing the character of the local community in **Pingrup** AND was our favourite example of Silo Art we had seen.



After our lunch at the new picnic shelter in front of the caravan park (a picnic rug from the Harley's car spread on the cold metal bench was much appreciated!) we left town at 12:30pm, on our way to **Katanning**.



Once we were settled into the **Katanning Kui Park** we made our way downtown for a coffee at the **Dome** with a quick shop for groceries in Woolies, plus fuel top-up before returning to the caravan park. Happy Hour was held in the Campers Kitchen with one last group photo.

Everyone agreed that it had been very enjoyable and we had seen some wonderful sights....and yes, we would do it all again!

Friday 9th (Day 5): After breakfast we all hooked up, said our farewells and went our separate ways.
